# Mel's Journey

The shelter received an email titled "Sick Cat". You always cringe when you see this because you don't know how sick the cat is, how much time the cat has left or if the cat is suffering because the person is unable or unwilling to provide care. This is one of the downsides to answering emails and phone messages. Some days you wonder if you can continue on, knowing full well that you will because, who else will do it?

The sick cat was Mel, a 6-year old orange tabby male and a newly diagnosed diabetic. Mel's family felt they couldn't offer him the proper treatment for his disease and had decided to euthanize him if they couldn't find someone that would take on the care and responsibility of a diabetic cat. Mel was a healthy boy otherwise. Unfortunately, LAPS was full and has quite a lengthy waiting list; what no-kill shelter isn't in the same situation? Plus, how could we take on a cat with a known medical condition when we need to be sure we can provide for our current residents? Then again, how could we not help Mel? After all, this is a treatable disease.

The idea to put out a plea for both financial assistance and a foster home was put into motion. Within hours we had pledges for financial assistance for Mel's care. However, two weeks later we realized we had exhausted all outlets for a foster home. Out of desperation, I decided to take Mel to work and foster him there.

Mel was surrendered to LAPS on a Monday afternoon and by Tuesday he acted like he had been at his foster home his entire life. Mel is one of the most sociable and loveable cats you will ever meet, and to this day, I cringe every time I think he could have been euthanized. Everybody who met him at work absolutely adored him. He appointed himself the people-greeter, and most days, he waited in the lobby for the scores of people that he knew would be visiting him. He is such a joy to be around and I'm glad we could save his life!

Mel was immediately made available for adoption on our website, petfinder.com and the Feline Diabetes Message Board (www.felinediabetes.com). In the meantime, the course of treatment that we decided to start Mel on was Glipizide, an oral blood-glucose-lowering drug. Unfortunately, after a month, it was decided that the Glipizide would have to be replaced by an injectable blood-glucose-lowering drug. I must say, Mel was a real trooper through it all.

A little over two months after having Mel, he was adopted by a wonderful woman from New York who saw his story on the Feline Diabetes Message Board. Having already had two diabetic cats, both now diet-controlled diabetics and not requiring any blood-glucose-lowering drugs, she decided to add Mel to her family. Once again, Mel is adjusting quite well to his new home and his new family. He is once again showing people how special he really is. This, too, proves that there are special people willing to adopt "special needs" cats.

This whole experience has taught me a lot! Diabetes shouldn't be a death sentence. I was what one would consider a "needle phobic". Needles literally made me pass out! But I wasn't going to let this cat die! Anybody can care for a diabetic cat, you just have to have the ambition and the mindset to do it! Yes, having a diabetic cat does require constant and consistent care. It does sometimes get tricky. I can't praise the Feline Diabetes Message Board enough. They are a wonderful and supportive community of people owned by diabetic cats. They were a tremendous help to me, a new diabetic cat caretaker, and I can honestly say I don't think I could have done it without their help. So if you find yourself having to care for a diabetic cat, I would highly recommend visiting www.felinediabetes.com. There you will find the confidence and support to take proper (and confident) care of your diabetic cat.

Feline diabetes is extremely complex and variable and not a deeply studied subject as I learned while caring for Mel. We have to keep in mind that veterinarian guidelines for treating feline diabetes are based on average results achieved with large numbers of animals. It's rare for an individual animal to fit nicely into that picture, so either you or your vet has to learn a lot about diabetes in YOUR cat so that your cat can be treated effectively and live many more happy years. I can't impress upon you enough the importance of home-testing blood for glucose levels and urine for ketones. I personally feel this could mean the difference between life and death for your cat. Please don't be overwhelmed, the feline diabetic community will be there to help you and your cat.

# My Tribute to Pooky How to Deal With the Loss of a Pet?

This is a question that I was faced with just recently. Dealing with the loss of a pet is a difficult and heartbreaking process. All too often, the pet parents feel they have nowhere to turn. Perhaps I can offer some help by telling you about my recent experience in the loss of my dear sweet cat Pooky.

My cat Pooky had been diagnosed with a bad heart. Thanks to a wonderful vet and his staff, Dr. Tom felt he could give us extra time together, with the help of medicine, if I was willing to stick to the regimen. Well, that certainly wasn't going to be hard; more time with my beloved cat. So we started the process, but about a year later, Pooky started to falter, even with regular check-ups. In June of this year, after spending all night up with Pooky, watching her condition, I knew the time had come for us to say our last goodbye. I called Dr. Tom's office and heard in the voice of the vet tech that she, too, was feeling the shock of the decision that had been made. I made the trip that morning to the office where I was given a good long time for us to say our final goodbyes. I will always remember that time as I stroked Pooky's fur and she kept butting my hand as if to say, "Please Mommy, don't stop petting me, I want to remember your touch at the bridge." And so I kept petting her. As the staff arrived, it was apparent that the time had come to assist Pooky across The Rainbow Bridge. And so we all gathered around to help ease her pain and to help her cross. After it was over, the staff hugged me and let me start the grieving process.

Please understand, it is perfectly alright to grieve the loss of your pet, your friend, your family member. Seek out family, clergy and especially your animal friends to help you through the process. I emailed all my animal friends, and in no time at all, their dear words of comfort started coming through.

Another good source is the HSUS site (www.hsus.org) which offers many tips on handling the loss of your pet. And please remember, it is okay to grieve for the one you loved.


